



1. Title of the Practice:

"Peace Education – Educating young minds towards better future"

2. Objectives of the Practice:

Objectives: To equip students with the knowledge, skills, and values necessary for peaceful conflict resolution, promoting global citizenship and communal harmony.

Underlying Principles or Concepts: The practice leverages the universal languages of art, music, and dance to teach values of empathy, non-violence, and respect for cultural diversity, transcending traditional academic learning barriers.

3. The Context

The Peace Education Program at St. Aloysius College aimed to instill 21st-century skills and peaceful conflict resolution through an innovative curriculum blending active learning with the arts. The main challenges included integrating this program into a diverse academic setting, maintaining engagement among students from multiple faculties, and overcoming language and cultural differences. 
4. The Practice

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required,






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Best Practice II


5. Evidence of Success




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
