Woman Cell was established in 1997 with the motto "Duty makes us do things well but love makes us do them beautifully". The cell works with the mission "The Women Cell shall strive to create a better and just society by empowering women." The vision of the cell is "To make the cell a unique platform for the development of its members, by providing them opportunities to contribute towards the betterment of the society."

Objectives of the Cell:

- To educate students about gender equity.
- To encourage students to adopt new perspectives and attitudes towards life, particularly concerning women.
- To foster greater involvement and cultivate responsible, value-oriented leadership among female students.
- To work towards a society that achieves social and economic gender equality as outlined in the Indian Constitution, through active social service.
- To engage with women in rural areas, informing them of their social and legal rights, and empowering them to oppose gender violence and discrimination.
- To raise awareness, instill values, and enhance the personality and leadership qualities of its members.

Activities and Initiatives:

The Cell also focuses on promoting hygiene practices to maintain a healthy environment in and around the college. It provides knowledge about legal rights and assistance in grievance redressal. Regularly, the cell organizes seminars and lectures led by specialists and distinguished figures to address issues such as violence against women, sexual harassment in the workplace, and health and hygiene.

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Comprehensive Facilities and Support for Female Students at St. Aloysius College

St. Aloysius College provides an array of facilities and support mechanisms designed to foster a supportive and inclusive environment for female students, ensuring their academic, physical, and emotional well-being.

Facilities for Girls in Campus:

- Multigym: The College provides a separate multi-gym facility for ladies with latest amenities like 2 treadmill, 1 cross trainer, 3 cycles, 1 twister and 10 pairs of dumbles of different weight.
- Sports: The College ensures the participation of women students in various intra and interinstitutional sports competitions led by a women sports officer who train and encourage
 women participation. Best athlete award is given annually. Following events are organized
 for the girl students in which every year 150 girls participate.

- Cultural: The cultural committee comprises of 90%-woman staff who motivate and prepare
 women student for competing in cultural events at all levels.
- NCC and NSS girls' units:
 - a) There are two NCC girls' units (Naval and Army) and one NSS girls' unit.
 - b) Various programmes are organized aiming the female students to make them sensitize towards the issues of women foeticide, AIDs awareness.
 - c) Girls are motivated to join these units

Ladies Room:

- a) A designated ladies' room is provided for rest and relaxation.
- The room maintains a quiet environment suitable for studying.
- c) It is equipped with a television, water cooler, and sanitation machine.
- Girls Washroom: The washrooms for girls have been refurbished with modern amenities with clean environment.

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- Girls Hostel: Enhanced accommodation is offered in the ladies' hostel, featuring adequate space, a pleasant ambiance, and a strategic location. Rules and regulations are strictly enforced to ensure compliance.
 - a) Security: The ambiance of the women's hostel is highly secure.
 - b) Student Participation: Students' representatives are appointed to participate in housekeeping and maintain discipline.
 - c) Warden's Role: The warden, Sr. Mercitta, ensures a home-like atmosphere for the girls.
 - d) Cultural Celebrations: The students celebrate various festivals such as Holi, Diwali, Eid, Christmas, and Onam, with full support from the hostel management for organizing these events.
 - e) Health and Safety: The hostel management provides transportation and accompaniment for sick students to reach healthcare facilities.
 - f) Security Measures: A security guard is stationed around the clock to ensure safety.
 - g) Recreational Facilities: Both indoor (caroms, chess) and outdoor (badminton court, table tennis court) game facilities are available.
 - h) Additional Amenities: The hostel is equipped with 10 PCs with Wi-Fi internet access and solar heaters for a consistent hot water supply.

Grievance and Redressal Committee

Students are the primary stakeholders in any educational institution, and we are committed to ensuring transparency in all activities at various stages. In alignment with this commitment, the college has established a mechanism for students to address their grievances, which includes the following areas:

- Grievances related to assessments
- Grievances related to victimization
- Grievances related to attendance
- Grievances related to fee charges
- Grievances regarding the conduct of examinations
- Harassment by fellow students or teachers
- Special sessions are organized with eminent judges, lawyers, and police personnel to educate female students about laws and by-laws, ensuring they are aware of their rights and responsibilities.
- The committee adheres to a policy of zero tolerance towards harassment.

Procedures of the Institutional Grievance Redressal Cell:

- A suggestion box is placed at a strategic location within the college where students can submit their grievances. The box is opened weekly and the contents are reviewed.
- Grievances are then forwarded to the Principal.
- The Principal addresses and resolves the grievances within one week.
- Students may also directly approach the Principal with their grievances in person or via email.

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 The Grievance Redressal Cell meets every four months to review grievances, which are categorized as either academic or administrative and are recorded in the Grievance Redressal Register.

Highlights of the activities of the Women cell

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Awareness Program: Women Cell organized Awareness Program on 24th to 26th August, 2023.

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Rastriya Krumimukti Diwas Program: The Women Cell of St. Aloysius College, Jabalpur organized Rastriya Kramimukti Diwas under the Office of Chief Medical and Health Office, Jabalpur on 12th to 15th September 2023. The purpose of this activity was to spread awareness among the girls' students about living a healthy life by taking proper nutrition's. Albendazole Chewable tablets that have been distributed among the girls students of all the classes. 2352 girls' students were benefitted by this program. 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Program on Yoga: Women Cell organized the one day Program on "**Yoga**" for girl students in collaboration with Department of Sports on 7th October, 2023. The trainer was Ms. Anjali Singh and Ms. Sakshi Chouksey. The aim of the program was to identify the importance of Yoga in their life & how to maintain the harmony between body and mind. The students knew the importance of yoga postures and promised to introduce this activity in their daily lives. 66 students were benefitted.



The initiative aimed to provide essential eye care services and raise awareness about the importance of regular eye checkup for overall health and well-being. 
